ABOUT THE PIECE

Occasionally, we as human beings find ourselves in times of despair. It is during these hopefully rare but unfortunately real moments, when happiness and well-being is at an all-time low, that searching for help not only feels like a possible solution but an absolute necessity.

We all come from different backgrounds with different experiences, and thus there are countless sources that we as individuals turn to in order to lift our spirits during these times of trial. Many of us look to our family, friends, or significant others. Many of us look to the memories of loved ones who have passed away. Many of us look to our faith or spirituality. Many of us deal with stress by turning to sources such as music, art, literature, athletics, dance, or any other outlets for which we have strong passion. Sometimes, we are in such dire need that we seek out a professional opinion, and in turn that professional will help us lay out a strategic plan for getting our lives back on track. Although it is ultimately up to us to heal and strengthen ourselves, reaching out or turning our focus to someone or something that we know, trust, and that carries great significance to us will only help on our journey to finding inner peace. This assertion is very much a part of the essence of *Guiding Light*.

From a dramatic standpoint, the piece is written entirely in the first person with the singer taking on the role of an indeterminate character in a state of utter despair. As this person closes their eyes and attempts to mentally escape from their suffering, they find themselves fixating on one image: "You". (This is where individual interpretations and sources come in, as each singer must have their own version of "You" constantly in their mind toward which they are directly speaking). Having identified "You" as the only potential solution to their distress, they then beseech "You" to give them hope, strength, and light. This latter word is the concept upon which the piece is crafted. Whatever, whoever, or however one's particular source of solace may be, *Guiding Light* aims to embody that source and present it in the form of something we all need to survive: **light**.

As the piece progresses and the need for help becomes more and more urgent, it eventually reaches its musical and textual peak: "You're my hope! You're my strength! You're my light at every dawn! You fill my life, even when you're gone". In this epiphanal moment, the singer realizes that they do not necessarily need anything from the "You" upon which they have been imploring, but rather that the thought of "You" and what "You" means to them is what gives them the courage and strength to carry onward. As the piece slowly and quietly comes to a close, the true meaning becomes clear: *Guiding Light* manifests the idea that at some point or another, we all need a light to act as a beacon of hope and guide us through our darkest days. Beyond anything else, however, it asserts that if we always carry that light in our hearts, we will never be alone.

ABOUT THE COMPOSER

Matt LaBerge is a composer, singer/songwriter, actor, and educator born and raised in South Portland, Maine. He holds a B.A. in Music from the University of Southern Maine in which his primary focuses were voice, theatre, and music composition.

As a composer, Matt began his journey at the University of Southern Maine where he wrote music for the USM Chamber Singers, Composers Ensemble, and the Student Performing Artists (SPA). His two original musicals, Here Come the Cattle! and Backwards, won awards for Best Performance and Best Musical respectively at the 2014 USM 10-Minute Play Competition. His original score for USM's live staged production of the Thrilling Adventure Hour's Beyond Belief earned him a nomination for Outstanding Sound Design through the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF). In 2014, he was selected as one of only ten students in the country to participate in the prestigious Palomar Film Music Workshop. In this time, Matt worked on scoring various film scenes under the guidance of renown film/television composers Larry Groupé (The Contender, Straw Dogs, Commander in Chief), and Roger Neill (Mozart in the Jungle, King of the Hill, CBS's Mom). For four summers, Matt served as Resident Composer and Music Director for The Big Maine Event, a fundraising concert which brings local Maine performers together with theatre professionals from across the country. For this concert, he wrote and directed the opening number, "Let's Bring Broadway to Maine", a musical theatre ensemble piece which has now been performed by stars such as Tony Award winner Trent Kowalik, original cast members from the Broadway productions of Billy Elliot The Musical, Fun Home, Mary Poppins, NBC's The Sound of Music Live, and many other talented performers from around the nation.

Equally at home as a singer/actor, Matt has performed with organizations such as the Ogunquit Playhouse, Maine State Music Theatre, Portland Ovations, PORTopera/Opera Maine, Portland Symphony Orchestra, and Boston Symphony Orchestra. Just recently, Matt music directed, wrote additional music for, and played the role of Bob Cratchit in the National Tour of *A Christmas Carol* through PerSeverance Productions.





